Trading Post started as a bar 1919. One step inside the door and you were among a vast eclectic collection of mounted heads, animal hides, stuffed animals, posters, signs, paintings, prints and photos. As his business and collection grew, he added a dance floor and restaurant. This unique Adirondack landmark continued until 1971 when Frank Teich retired.

Letter from the Director

The 4th Annual Postcard-Paper-Bottle Show and sale on Saturday, August 2nd at the Municipal Building on Park Avenue in Old Forge was a huge success with twenty dealers and increased attendance.

In September, I attended the New Directors Institute hosted by Upstate History Alliance at The Sagamore in Raquette Lake. I was one of 21 other "new directors" at this 4-day intense training made possible in part by support from the New York State Council of the Arts. Speakers from many areas of administration were available for one-on-one consultations before and after the training sessions.

The first printing of "Old Forge-Gateway to the Adirondacks" has almost sold out and a second printing has been ordered. The Historical Association has received its first royalty check.

The Board of Trustees has completed the first program of a three step grant prossess to move the organization forward. This grant is sponsored by New York State Council on the Arts and administered by Upstate History Alliance which assists organizations in long-term planning.

Weedmark Family Legacy—by Town of Webb Historian Peg Masters

Four years ago in September of 1999, local photographer William Porter (Bill) Weedmark passed away at the age of seventy-one. He was born in Ilion, NY in 1927 - the first and only child of William H. and Marion Porter Weedmark. Two years after Bill's birth, when his mother died of pulmonary and kidney disease, his grief-stricken father brought the toddler to Old Forge to be raised by his grandparents Archibald William "Pop" and Mary Ellen Weedmark. A self-described "spirited lad," Bill none-the-less excelled at school and graduated in 1946 valedictorian of his class.

Bill loved to listen to his grandparents' stories of the pioneer settlement of the Old Forge region. "Pop" Weedmark, was born in 1864 in Ontario, came to the States at the age of 14, and settled eventually in Lyons Falls. For a time he

worked at the tannery at the Moose River Settlement, then got a job on a log drive down the river but nearly drowned. In September of 1891, he married Mary Ellen MacDougall in Lyons Falls and they traveled to Old Forge by buckboard on the ol' Brown's Tract Road to begin their married life. The newlyweds obtained work "winter sitting" Dr. Niccolls Camp on the point between First and Second Lakes and survived on hard tack and beans. For the next several years they lived at the Soper Camp on First Lake. In 1895 they purchased one of the Garmon & Crosby lots on Adams Street for \$150. The Weedmarks built a home in 1896 over a hand-dug stone foundation to shelter their growing family that included three sons; William H. born in 1894, John E. born in 1896, and Harry W. born in 1899.

Bill's grandmother Mary took in washing and ironing to supplement her husband's guiding fees. A woodstove kept the family warm and was used for cooking their food and heating the wash water. Mary died in 1946, the same year her grandson graduated from high school. Bill's talent and passion for taking and developing photographs began early in the 1940's

while he was still a student. Grandpa "Pop" Weedmark continued to work as a guide and caretaker for the Soper family and at the Ely Camp at Little Moose Lake. He was a lifelong member of the North Woods Lodge 849, F & AM, and one of the early members of the Old Forge Fire Department. "Pop" died in 1980 at his home on Adams Street at the age of 95. He was the last surviving member of the Brown's Tract Guides Association that organized in 1898.

After graduation, Bill worked for the Town of Webb, married Naomi Joy in 1955, and operated a photography studio out of his grandparents' home on Adams Street. At the time of his death in 1999, thousands of photographs and negatives were tucked into bureau and desk drawers, cabinets and assorted boxes in an order known only to him. His two sons, Bill and John, decided to donate the extensive collection to the Town of Webb Historical Association.

Dedicated volunteers have spent scores of hours since that time cataloging the collection and developing a computerized index. More than fifty years of our Town's history are pictorially documented in Bill's photographs. His camera shutter was clicking in 1946 at the Decoration Day Parade on Main Street, at the 1947 Winter Carnival when Max Boli was giving ski lessons and that same year at the collapse of the McKeever dam. He was there at the Charbonneau family reunion in 1949 and the Barrett family reunion of the Bald Mountain House in 1992. Bill time-capsuled for future generations - photographs of the construction of a ski jump in 1953, the deCamp (Harrison) estate auction in 1954, the WWI veterans dinner at the American Legion in 1955, the auction of Hollywood Hills properties in 1962 - and hundreds of other events, people and places in our township.

For years he did the photographic work for the Town of Webb school yearbooks. Bill was the photographer of choice by more than 200 brides - some even planned their wedding dates around his availability. He had a passion for aerial photography - survived a float plane plunge into the Old Forge Pond in the 1950s and escaped with a fractured jaw that kept his mouth wired shut for weeks. The spectacular pictures from the air include the hamlets in Webb, the hotels along the Fulton Chain of Lakes, the building of the Enchanted Forest, the Old Forge Airport, and the McCauley Mt. ski area.

Bill Weedmark served for many years as a Trustee of the Historical Association and was gifted with an incredible sense of humor as well as his photographic talent. He will not be forgotten. The history of this pioneer family and legacy of his photographic collection helps us to better understand our past and share our unique heritage with many generations to come. Today, the collection is protected and housed in archival storage folders and boxes at the Historical. More work is needed to identify and date the photographs, a project coordinated by Trustee Harry Kellogg.
